„Konflikt & Kooperation in Asien-Pazifik“ Mittwochs, 12-14 Uhr (Grabengasse 3-5, Neue Uni Hörsaal 02)

Ziel dieses Kurses ist es, den Studierenden einen theorieorientierten Überblick über zwischenstaatliche Konflikte und Kooperation im asiatisch-pazifischen Raum seit dem Ende des Zweiten Weltkrieges zu geben. Die TeilnehmerInnen werden die an den Prozessen beteiligten Akteure und Institutionen kennenlernen und vor dem Hintergrund verschiedener Analyseebenen, wie etwa dem internationalen System, den innenpolitischer Strukturen sowie nichtstaatliche Akteure, unterschiedlichen Konflikt- und Kooperationsmustern in Asien-Pazifik nachgehen.

Neben dem Erwerb theoretischen und analytischen Wissens werden sich die TeilnehmerInnen intensiv mit einer großen Spannweite an empirischen Fallstudien im asiatisch-pazifischen Raum beschäftigen, wie etwa dem Aufstieg Chinas, dem Konflikt auf der koreanischen Halbinsel, der Taiwan-Frage, dem US-Pivot to Asia, den Spannungen im Südchinesischen Meer sowie regionalen Governance-Strukturen zur Regelung und Beilegung regionaler Konflikte. Dabei werden sowohl bilaterale Beziehungen als auch multilaterale Institutionen in den Blick genommen und anhand verschiedener Politikfelder behandelt.
